## **Decision**

- 1. For the reasons set out below and in accordance with section 32A(7) of the Liquor Act the Commission has determined to temporarily vary the conditions of the liquor licence for the premises known as the Katherine Club Inc. by varying the conditions to provide the trading hours for ANZAC Day, being Thursday 25 April 2019, to be between:
  - a. From 05:00am and 06:00am for Gunfire Breakfast associated services including the provision of rum and milk to RSL members and veterans.
  - b. From 06:45am and 08:29am liquor sales are permitted for on premises consumption only.

- c. From 08:30am until 09:29am the premises shall be permitted to continue to trade however liquor sales are not authorised during this time.
- d. From 09:30am until 09:59am liquor sales are permitted for on premises consumption only.
- 2. In accordance with section 32A(9) the variation of the condition of licence is to take effect as at Friday 5 April 2019.

## **Reasons**

### Background

- 3. Katherine Club Inc. ("the applicant") currently holds a Club (Incorporated) Liquor Licence authorising the sale of liquor:
  - a. for consumption on or at the licensed premises by a member of the club or by a visitor in the presence of such a member.
  - b. for removal and consumption away from the licensed premises **<u>only</u>** to financial members of the Club.
- 4. The licensee is the applicant and the nominee under the liquor licence is Ms Alison Vincent. On 15 February 2019 the applicant made application pursuant to section 32A of the Act for a variation to their licence conditions with respect to ANZAC Day. The Director-General of Licensing ("the Director-General") referred the application to this Commission on 22 March 2019.
- 5. The applicant's current liquor licence makes no specific provision for ANZAC Day. It does however enable the applicant to trade seven (7) days per week except Good Friday and Christmas Day.
- 6. In 2019, ANZAC Day falls on Thursday 25 April 2019. In accordance with the current conditions of the licence, the applicant can therefore commence trade from 10:00am on a Thursday. The applicant however seeks to trade on ANZAC Day between 5.00am to 10.00am to provide its usual array of services that it provides at the club on ANZAC Day. The Commission was advised that the premises are in fact the home of the Katherine RSL Sub-Branch and as a result it provides services to the RSL on ANZAC Day and has been doing so "for the past 20 years".
- 7. The application sets out that the Applicant proposes a schedule as follows:

"Commence at 5am at the Katherine Club for the traditional "Gun Fire Breakfast" (rum & milk). Tea, coffee, juice and water also available.

6am dawn service at the new cenotaph.

Approx. 6.30am breakfast at the Katherine Club with the service of a full breakfast, tea, coffee, juice water, soft drinks and the Traditional rum &

milk. All money raised from the breakfast is donated to the Katherine RSL Sub-Branch.

Approx. 9.45am ANZAC Day march and service at the new cenotaph.

10am the Katherine Club will offer the Traditional rum and milk and the service of mid-strength and full-strength beverages.

Lunch service from 11.30am.

A traditional game of Two Up will be played in the beer garden area commencing at approximately 12 noon with all proceeds (if any) being donated to the Katherine RSL Sub-Branch".

- 8. With respect to this applicant, the Commission was informed by the Director-General that the event had "been held at this venue for at least 20 years". A check of the records held at Licensing NT indicated there was no previous adverse history in relation to compliance issues. Compliance officers in Katherine were also spoken to and were "unaware of any problems or compliance issues regarding this event".
- 9. It appears on the evidence provided that the applicant has a proven and demonstrated capacity to be able to operate this venue and to comply with the conditions of its licence very effectively and particularly in relation to ANZAC Day commemorations.

#### Disclosure of influential persons or potential beneficiaries

- 10. The Commission notes that section 32A(1A) of the Act requires applicants to make an affidavit disclosing whether certain persons may be able to influence the applicant, or expect a benefit from the applicant, if the licence is granted. The applicant has filed such an affidavit via its assistant manager, Ms Angela Harding.
- 11. The Act prescribes that upon the application being filed, together with the affidavit under section 26A, there must be investigations conducted by the Director-General in relation to the application. The Commission has received no information to indicate there have been any adverse matters discovered as a result of the investigation by the Director-General.

#### Advertising and Objections

- 12. The Commission was advised that the Director-General had exercised her discretion under section 32A(2) and not required the applicant to publish a notice of the application due to an assessment of the application and deeming there was insufficient public interest.
- 13. It is noted that section 32A(5) of the Act requires that the Director-General must inform:
  - a. the Chief Executive Officer ("CEO") of the Department of Health ("DOH");

- b. the Commissioner of Police; and
- c. if the application relates to premises within the area of a shire council or a regional council the Chief Executive Officer ("CEO") of the council.
- 14. That occurred with respect to this application with the following response received:
  - a. The DOH made no adverse comment.
  - b. The NT Police had no objection.
  - c. The Katherine Town Council had no objection.
- 15. Notice was also provided to the Northern Territory Fire and Rescue Service who advised that they also had "no objection" to the application.

## **Public Hearing**

- 16. Pursuant to section 50 of the Act, the Director-General of Licensing ("the Director-General") must refer *inter alia* applications under section 32A of the Act to the Commission. Therefore this application must be heard and determined by this Commission.
- 17. Pursuant to section 53 of the Act, the Chairperson of the Commission must fix the time and place for hearing and give notice to the relevant parties not less than 7 days before the hearing date. As stated earlier, this application was referred to the Commission on 22 March 2019. The hearing was fixed for 12.00 noon on 3 April 2019 and notice was given to the applicant.
- 18. Pursuant to section 53 of the Act; the Commission is not bound by the rules of evidence and may inform itself in the manner it considers appropriate and conduct the hearing, or part of the hearing, by use of telephone or online facilities. A hearing must also be conducted in public unless the Commission considers that a public hearing is likely to cause undue hardship to a person. No such submission has been made to this Commission and there is no evidence to suggest any such hardship.
- 19. Mr Alex Bruce of Hospitality NT appeared on behalf of the applicant with Ms Alison Vincent and Mr John O'Brien being linked in from Katherine. Mr Jeff Verinder as representative for the Director-General of Licensing was also present to provide information and assistance to the Commission during the course of the hearing.

## Assessment of the Application

20. As earlier noted, there were no objections to this application. Despite there being no objections made to the application lodged by the Applicant, the Act clearly provides that the Director-General of Licensing must refer these types of applications to the Commission for decision. In addition, section 6B of the Act

makes clear that it is the Applicant who bears the onus of satisfying the Commission that the approval of the application meets the public interest and community impact test.

21. As is clear from section 6(1) of the Act; when considering or determining an application under the Act in respect of licensed premises, this Commission *must* apply the public interest and community impact test as relevant to the application. Section 6(2) of the Act provides that:

"For subsection (1), the public interest and community impact test requires consideration of the following objectives:

- a. harm or ill-health caused to people, or a group of people, by the consumption of liquor is to be minimised;
- b. liquor is to be sold, or sold and consumed, on licensed premises in a responsible manner;
- c. public order and safety must not be jeopardised, particularly where circumstances or events are expected to attract large numbers of persons to licensed premises or an area adjacent to those premises;
- d. the safety, health and welfare of persons who use licensed premises must not be put at risk;
- e. noise emanations from licensed premises must not be excessive;
- f. business conducted at licensed premises must not cause undue offence, annoyance, disturbance or inconvenience to persons who reside or work in the neighbourhood of the premises or who are making their way to or from, or using the services of, a place of public worship, hospital or school;
- g. a licensee must comply with provisions of this Act and any other law in force in the Territory which regulate in any manner the sale or consumption of liquor or the location, construction or facilities of licensed premises, including:
  - i. by-laws made under the Local Government Act; and
  - ii. provisions of or under the Planning Act;
- h. each person involved in the business conducted at licensed premises must receive suitable training relevant to the person's role in the conduct of the business;
- i. the use of credit in the sale of liquor must be controlled;
- j. practices which encourage irresponsible drinking must be prohibited;

- k. it may be necessary or desirable to limit any of the following:
  - i. the kinds of liquor that may be sold;
  - ii. the manner in which liquor may be sold;
  - iii. the containers, or number or types of containers, in which liquor may be sold;
  - iv. the days on which and the times at which liquor may be sold;
- it may be necessary or desirable to prohibit persons or limit the number of persons who may be on licensed premises, on any particular part of licensed premises or in an adjacent area subject to the control of the licensee;
- m. it may be necessary or desirable to prohibit or limit the entertainment, or the kind of entertainment, which may be provided on licensed premises or in an adjacent area under the control of the licensee;
- n. it may be necessary or desirable to prohibit or limit promotional activities in which drinks are offered free or at reduced prices;
- any sale of additional liquor due to the grant of a licence or the relaxation of restrictive conditions will not increase anti-social behaviour."
- 22. In addition, pursuant to section 6(3), the Commission must:
  - a. consider the potential impact on the community in the area that would be affected by the outcome of the decision to grant or refuse an application or the changing of conditions of a licence and, in doing so, must have regard to:
    - i. the harm that might be caused (whether to the community as a whole or a group within the community) due to the excessive or inappropriate consumption of liquor; and
    - ii. the cultural, recreational, employment or tourism impacts; and
    - iii. the social impact in, and the impact on the amenity of, the locality of the premises or proposed premises; and
    - iv. the density of existing liquor licences within the community area; and
    - v. the volume of alcohol sales within the community area, and any increase in volume within the community area arising from the licence the subject of the application; and

- vi. any other prescribed matter; and
- b. apply the community impact assessment guidelines."
- 23. On 6 March 2018, pursuant to section 6A of the Act, the Minister by Gazette notice published community impact assessment guidelines for determining whether or not an application being considered or determined under section 6(1) satisfies the public interest and community impact test. Relevantly those guidelines are stated to

"... set out those matters that will be considered by the Commission when assessing the community impact of the application against the criteria set out in section 6A(1) of the Liquor Act".

24. Those matters are identified as follows:

Criteria	Matters to be considered

25. As can be seen from the above, there are a large number of matters that this Commission must consider and that the Applicant must address (and satisfy the Commission of) under the new public interest and community impact test and guidelines. The guidelines do make clear however that:

"... the Commission has the authority to consider a broad range of issues specific to each application and flexibility exists to assess each individual application on its merits".

- 26. With respect to this application, the Commission considers it relevant to note that this is not an application for a new licence. This is an application to vary conditions of an existing licence that already enables the premises to be open for trade, but to enable the applicant for 2019 only to be able to sell liquor on premises for a period where it would not ordinarily be able to do so in order to provide for ANZAC Day commemorations, which are services it has been providing for the last 20 years without complaint.
- 27. It is an application that is entirely centred on being able to provide a venue that allows the Katherine RSL to provide for its members and to enable persons to *commemorate* ANZAC Day. This was further reinforced by the fact that the applicant sought that their ability to sell liquor be "paused" whilst the ANZAC Day march occurred, such is the solemnity that the applicant recognises around the day.
- 28. The applicant has provided submissions addressing the public interest and community impact test and also the community impact assessment guidelines. It is clear that the applicant has taken this application seriously and likewise takes its licence conditions seriously when it comes to providing for ANZAC Day in particular. The Commission's confidence in this regard is further reinforced by the applicant's clear ability to operate the premises in an appropriate manner and in accordance with the terms of its licence having done for at least 20 years.
- 29. In all of the circumstances, including the limited nature of the application, the processes put in place by the applicant to ensure appropriate service and consumption of alcohol at all times and that there is no evidence of any

compliance issues or particular adverse impact upon the community; this Commission is, on balance, satisfied that it is appropriate to vary the conditions of the licence as sought. Therefore, for the reasons outlined and having regard to the objects of the Act the Commission has decided to vary the conditions of the licence as outlined at the start of this Decision Notice.

## Notice of Rights:

- 30. Section 120ZA of the Act provides that a reviewable decision is a Commission decision that is specified in the Schedule to the Act. A decision to vary the conditions of a liquor licence pursuant to section 32A of the Act is specified in the Schedule and is a reviewable decision.
- 31. Section 120ZC of the Act provides that a person affected by this decision may seek a review before the Northern Territory Civil and Administrative Tribunal. Any application for review of this decision must be lodged within 28 days of the date of this decision.
- 32. For the purpose of this decision, and in accordance with section 120ZB(1)(b) and (c) of the Act, the affected person is the applicant.
